Equipment & Activities for Fine Motor Development

Activities for Fine Motor Skill Development

Fine motor skills are used everyday. They are used to tie our shoes, fasten & unfasten buttons, pick up small objects, or point at something. In school, your child must be hold a pencil, cut with scissors, & turn pages in a book.

The following is a list of equipment & activities that will help your child refine their fine motor abilities.

Shape-Fitting Activities

- Shapes: Place shapes into corresponding holes. There are commercial shape boards available
- Puzzles: from simple (few pieces, non interlocking, with knobs) to complex (more pieces, interlocking, no knobs)
- Puzzles made from a variety of materials like laminated magazine pages, pictures glued on cardboard with shapes drawn and cut out, large photo of your child cut into shapes.
- Large floor puzzles

Toys to Dress Up

 Dress up dolls and teddy bears with simple clothes, hat, scarf, loose jacket, elasticized pants, skirt, etc.

Puppets

- Hand puppets
- Finger puppets

Hammering Toys

- Peg and hammer toys
- Toys with balls & mallets
- · Golf tees into styrofoam blocks
- Xvlophone

Peg Boards

- Use a variety of sizes and patterns.
- Toys like trains, trucks, boats, etc. that require putting little people into seats.
- Lite Brite
- Sticking golf tees into styrofoam blocks.

Toys with Keys & Buttons to Press with One Finger

- Cash register
- Piano
- Camera
- Typewriter Computer

Imaginative Play Sets

Fisher Price Farm, toy Doctor's Kit,
& Log Building sets.

Plastic Materials

 Play dough and plasticine with rolling pins, cookie cutters, objects to press in, sturdy plastic knives and forks, spatula, etc.

Scooping and Pouring Tasks

 Use corn, peas, beans, sand, rice, etc. with bowls, jugs, scoops, spoons, etc.

Board & Card Games

- Age appropriate games
- Holding cards and picking up card from a pile

Picture and Pattern Boards

- Tile boards
- Felt picture boards
- Make a Velcro picture board with one type of velcro all over it and felt pieces with the other type of velcro on the back of each piece.
- Make a magnetic picture board out of a sheet of metal, fridge stickers, & other small items with

magnetized rubber tape on the back

Sorting Activities

Vary the size and shape of objects and the type of containers. You can sort large buttons, corn, peas, beans, paper clips, bingo chips, golf tees, & beads into egg boxes, old sewing boxes, tackle boxes, matchboxes, T.V. dinner trays, jars, & bottles.

Drawing

- Chalk and chalk boards
- Crayons and paper
- Stencils & templates
- Felts
- Finger Paints
- Paints

Cutting, Tearing, Folding

- Variety of kinds of paper probably needs demonstrations and help to use these materials constructively
- Controlled tearing
- Folding
- Wrapping/unwrapping activities
- · Cutting any craft activity
